

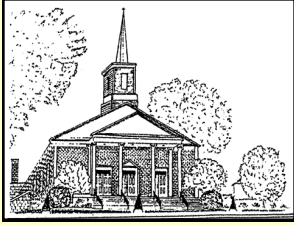

Lenten Friday Stations of the Cross followed by Benediction and Confessions

Please join us for Stations of the Cross on Lenten Fridays at 7pm in the Church, followed by Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament. Confessions are heard after Benediction. Kindly note that Benediction is not permitted on Good Friday.

LENTEN REGULATIONS for Baptized Catholics in the United States

1. **Good Friday, March 29, 2024 is a day of obligatory FAST (only one full meal) and ABSTINENCE (no meat). No dispensation is granted on this solemn day except for reason of sickness or for those provided in canon law.**
2. **All other Fridays of Lent are days of ABSTINENCE .**
3. Those between the ages of 18 and 59 are obliged to FAST (only one full meal) on Good Friday, as above. From the age of 14, people are obliged to ABSTAIN (no meat: this obligation prohibits the eating of meat, but not eggs, milk products or condiments of any kind, even though made from animal fat).
4. The obligation to observe the laws of fast and abstinence is a serious one for Catholics. Failure to observe one penitential day in itself is not considered a serious sin. It is the failure to observe any penitential days at all, or a substantial number of days, which must be considered serious.

A Note From Our Pastor

My Dear Parishioners,

**"Give me justice, O God,
and plead my cause against a nation that is faithless.
From the deceitful and cunning rescue me,
for you, O God are my strength."**

We pray these words in the Entrance Antiphon of today's Mass. A loud clamor for justice can be heard throughout a large section of humanity, for a better-assured peace within an atmosphere of mutual respect between men, and between the peoples of the world. This desire to construct a more just world in which greater respect is given to man, who has been created by God in His image and likeness, is a fundamental part of the hunger and thirst for justice which must exist in the heart of a Christian. All of Jesus' preaching is a call to justice (in its fullness and without diminution) and to mercy.

Our Lord himself condemns the Pharisees, who devour widows' houses and for a pretense make long prayers. And it is the Apostle Saint James who addresses this harsh reproach to those who grow rich through fraud and injustice: *Your riches have rotted ... Behold, the wages of the laborers who mowed your fields, which you kept back by fraud, cry out; and the cries of the harvesters have reached the ears of the Lord of hosts.*

The Church, in faithfulness to the teaching of Holy Scripture, urges us to unite ourselves to this clamor of the world and to turn it into a prayer that reaches our Father God. At the same time she impels and urges us to live the demands that justice makes on our personal lives at a professional and social level, and to defend those who - because they are weaker - cannot avail themselves of their rights. The Christian is not expected to make sterile lamentations. Instead of complaining, Our Lord wants us to atone for the acts of injustice which are daily committed throughout the world: He wants us to try to remedy as many injustices as we can, starting with those that occur closest to us, in the sphere in which we move, just there where we live: the mother in her home with all those around her; the businessman in his firm; the professor in his University ...

The ultimate solution for restoring and promoting justice at all levels lies in the heart of each man. It is in the heart that every type of injustice imaginable comes into existence, and it is there also that the possibility of straightening out all human relationships is conceived. By denying or trying to deny God, who is his Beginning and End, man profoundly disturbs his own order and interior balance and also those of society and even of visible creation.

Lent, 2024

Dear Parishioners,

At every Mass, we are familiar with seeing the red book, called the Missal, used by the priest to celebrate Mass. This is one of the liturgical books alongside the Lectionary which contains all the scriptural readings. Another liturgical book which is less familiar is called the Gradual. This book contains all of the liturgical music published by the Vatican to be sung during the Mass. The music in this book contains what are called the Propers, that is, the sung scriptural texts sung during the Entrance, the Offertory, and Communion (proper or unique to each Mass), as well as what is called the Ordinary: the Kyrie, Gloria, Credo, Sanctus, and Agnus Dei (what is ordinary or the same for each Mass).

It is perhaps surprising to some Catholics that even though the Church permits the Mass to be celebrated entirely in vernacular languages, She still encourages Latin to be used in the Mass *alongside* the vernacular. In fact, Vatican II states that "Particular law remaining in force, the use of the Latin language is to be preserved in the Latin rites" (*Sacrosanctum Concilium*, paragraph 36). The same document goes further, stating that "steps should be taken so that the faithful may also be able to say or to sing together in Latin those parts of the Ordinary of the Mass which pertain to them." (SC. P54)

Eleven years later, in 1974, the *Jubilate Deo* chants were published by the Sacred Congregation for Divine Worship and given to every bishop throughout the world to provide what was called "the minimum repertoire of Gregorian chants" to be sung in every parish church and cathedral of the Roman Rite. These chants were given "in response to a desire which the Holy Father had frequently expressed, that all the faithful should know at least some Latin Gregorian chants, such as, for example, the "*Gloria*", the "*Credo*", the "*Sanctus*", and the "*Agnus Dei*." (The "Kyrie" is Greek, not Latin).

During our celebration of Lent this year, we will be seeking to implement a part of this vision of Vatican II by singing the Sanctus, Memorial Acclamation, and Agnus Dei in Latin at all our weekend Masses. Even if the Latin is unfamiliar (or even if you personally dislike it for your own reasons), I invite you to open your hearts and minds to these beautiful and sacred texts. With time, these chants will become easier and more familiar. The style of chant may seem strange and different than other kinds of music but therein lies the key to its sacredness - it is a musical style set apart for divine worship! In fact, the Church's tradition of Gregorian chant descends from the tradition of Jewish chanting in the Temple of Jerusalem. The chants we will be singing have been sung by generations of saints and some of these chant hymns have even been written by saints!

I hope you will be open to learning and singing these beautiful and sacred chants and that you allow them to lift up your hearts and voices in the praise of God at Mass. Following this tradition, we will chant the Matins/Lauds of Holy Thursday on Wednesday, March 27, beginning at 7:00pm. The Schola in the front pews will alternate chanting the psalm verses. The clergy will chant the lessons that separate the psalms. A 15-candle "hearse" shaped like a triangle will be present. As each psalm is completed, 1 candle is extinguished, until only the top candle is left - representing the Apostles abandoning Christ in his darkest hour. Today is Passion Sunday Beginning of Passiontide

Statues and crucifixes are veiled until the Gloria of the Easter Vigil. From today until Holy Thursday, please note the following changes in the Holy Mass:

- ◆ The *Júdica Me* (Psalm 42) is omitted in the priest's prayers at the foot of the Altar.
- ◆ There is no "Gloria Patri..." after the Introit.
- ◆ There is no "Gloria Patri..." after the Lavabo.

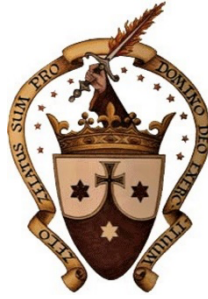

THE FIRST SUNDAY OF OUR LORD'S PASSION

Ÿ. Praised be Jesus Christ... **Ŕ.** Now and forever!

*Júdica me, Deus, et discérne causam
meam de gente non sancta:
ab hómine iníquo et dolóso éripe me:
quia tu es Deus meus et fortitúdo mea.*

**Judge me, O God, and distinguish my cause
from the nation that is not holy:
deliver me from the unjust and
deceitful man, for Thou art my God and my strength.**
[Ps 42: 1-2]

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ, today is the first Sunday of Our Lord's Passion. Last week was Laetare Sunday – full of rejoicing. The Church returns to being more forlorn. We observe the covering of statues – nothing will now distract us from our focus on the sufferings of Jesus. Today's reading from Hebrews points to the new type of sacrifice that Jesus offers; if the blood of goats and calves could offer expiation for sin, then how much more is the blood of the God-man effective in atoning for sin! His sacrifice, through the operation of the Holy Spirit, will cleanse the consciences of us poor sinners from our dead works – enabling us to aspire to life everlasting. The Gospel of today is from what we hold to be an eyewitness account from the Beloved Disciple. The readings of Passiontide tell of the escalation of tensions between Jesus and the religious authorities. He no longer speaks in parable – he speaks plainly, arriving at logical conclusions which confound them. The follower of God hears the word of God; since they do not hear the words of Jesus, Our Lord convicts them in their stubbornness and sinfulness.

And what about us – are we truly hearing the voice of the Master? Many souls wish to place Our Lord on the shelf, pulling Him down for a Sunday observance. Holy Lent is a clarion call to conversion through increased prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. The Carmelite realizes the great gift of penance. We aim to follow Our Lord not only at Cana, but particularly Our Lord at Calvary. In conforming ourselves into His passion and death, we prepare ourselves for life everlasting. *"Ave Crux, spes unica!"* exclaimed St. Edith Stein. *"Hail, Thou Cross, our one hope!"* Again, with no cross, there is no crown. Central to Carmelite thought is doing away with earthly attachments [even little ones], save the cross of Christ. We seek not the dead works and things of this passing life – did you ever see a U-Haul follow a hearse? Neither have we. Let us make it our care and joy to reasonably forswear the things of earth. The ice cream given up during Lent should lead us to greater things to demonstrate our burning love for Christ Crucified. To Jesus Christ be all glory!

"Any one of these imperfections, if the soul has become attached and habituated to it, is of as great harm to its growth and progress in virtue as though it were to fall daily into many other imperfections and usual venial sins which proceed not from a habitual indulgence in any habitual and harmful attachment and will not hinder it so much as when it has attachment to anything. For as long as it has this, there is no possibility that it will make progress in perfection, even though the imperfection be extremely slight.

For it comes to the same thing whether a bird be held by a slender cord or by a stout one; since, even if it be slender, the bird will be well held as though it were stout, for so long as it breaks it not and flies not away. It is true that the slender one is the easier to break; still, easy though it be, the bird will not fly away if it be not broken.

And thus, the soul that has attachment to anything, however much virtue it possesses, will not attain to the liberty of Divine union."
